

A Guide for Using Building Belonging by John Cleghorn

"With a focus on housing neighbors and building community, the church is uniquely positioned to respond. The call to heal the nation with more housing and enriched communities comes from within and beyond the church."

These words in the opening chapter of Building Belonging: The Church's Call to Create Community and House Our Neighbors by John Cleghorn provide the foundation for this guide intended for congregations and communities. The five steps outlined here are meant to be a starting point for those looking to implement the strategies from Cleghorn's book after they first consider how their financial needs and goals can be addressed in a development initiative. As Cleghorn writes regarding why congregations decide to undertake development projects, "Some describe a purely missional call to build housing. Other congregations get close enough to the tomb to take a long look inside and then decide it's time to trust God in altogether new ways" (p. 25). Once your congregation has done the work to determine your missional call and/or how your congregation's financial needs can be met by such an investment, you can then begin the work outlined in the five steps of this guide. This initial planning should also include determining the specific financial metrics that need to be met by a project: whether you need an up-front, lump-sum amount; ongoing income; or a combination.

After this initial step is taken, and as your church evaluates its next step in addressing the housing crisis in your neighborhood, this guide will help your group identify its guiding values, determine the information needed to begin, assemble team members and community partners, build a budget, and construct a project timeline.

You'll notice that the guide is divided into steps rather than sessions. The call to create community and house neighbors is an ongoing process; each step will require multiple meetings, and you'll need to revisit them throughout the journey. As you work through this guide, refer to Appendix B, "Principles of Discernment" (p. 159), as a touchstone to guide you through the process. Additionally, for resources to deepen your understanding and help define your project as listed in Appendix D (p. 162-69), visit the website for Caldwell Presbyterian Church, the author's congregation. The site includes videos of their conversations and sermons, as well as lists of other resources.





A note on the prayers included in this guide: those at the end of each step are from the *Glory to God* hymnal and have been chosen in part because the copyright holders have given permission for churches to print the words in bulletins or other worship resources. Please consider using these prayers not only with your team but also with your larger congregation as you incorporate this new ministry into your weekly worship.

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DEFINING OUR VALUES: BUILDING FAITHFUL VISIONING (PART 1)

Opening Prayer

Loving God, help us to invest the time and energy needed to understand the hearts and minds, challenges and circumstances, and hopes and dreams of our neighbors. Show us how each neighbor is an individual child of God with distinct and personal needs and goals so we may meet, know, and love each neighbor individually. Amen.

Defining Values

As described in chapter 6 (see pp. 149-53), Caldwell Presbyterian Church spent two years preparing for their neighbors to move in. Their team created the church's learning track by beginning with the values that rooted their mission. As you consider your team's project and mission, take time to define your team's values.

VALUES

Brainstorming Building Blocks of Faithful Visioning

Using the first two "building blocks of faithful visioning" as described on page 129, explore your community and context, as well as your assets, resources, strengths, and weaknesses.

COMMUNITY & CONTEXT

- What is the history of your community?
- Who has been displaced, excluded, or overlooked?
- Who is suffering, vulnerable, powerless, or underserved?
- What is the history of the church? Has it done harm to others in its community that needs repair?
- What is the church's passion?
- What population is the church called to serve?
- What services currently exist for those in need?
- Is there a gap the church can help fill, one that no one else will step up to address?





ASSETS, RESOURCES, STRENGTHS, & WEAKNESSES

- What resources does the congregation have to offer?
- What professional skills and lived experiences do church members have that can be harnessed?
- Does the church have social capital on which to draw?
- Does the church have the stamina for what will inevitably be a yearslong and, at times, arduous undertaking?
- What blind spots might limit its vision?
- What shortages might hinder a big undertaking? Can they be overcome?

DEFINING OUR VALUES: BUILDING FAITHFUL VISIONING (PART 2)

Opening Prayer

God of preparation, guide us in creating a home—a space and place where true community can form—for our neighbors. Remind us of the need for education and preparation as we seek to form healthy, respectful, and informed relationships. Amen.

Reaffirming & Defining Values

Throughout this process, ensure that you are keeping the values guiding your preparation in the forefront. Remind yourselves of the values you have designated so far and update them as needed.

VALUES

Brainstorming Building Blocks of Faithful Visioning

Using the third through fifth "building blocks of faithful visioning" as described on pages 129-30, take the time to explore your neighborhood, government and public policy, and partners and partnerships.

NEIGHBORHOOD

- What connects the church to its immediate neighbors and neighborhood?
- Does the church have insights into how its neighbors would receive the idea of housing (or any other bold public witness)?
- How many members live near the church? How many live in other parts of town, and how might that matter?
- Who will advocate for the church's vision, and who won't?
- How can the church turn "Not in my backyard" (NIMBY) into "Yes in God's backyard" (YIGBY)?





GOVERNMENT & PUBLIC POLICY

- Is local government focused on affordable housing? If so, how?
- What initiatives has it launched and why?
- Has it considered houses of faith as part of the solution?
- What financial resources are available through national, state, and local governments?
- How is your land zoned, and would that have to be changed?
- What's involved in changing zoning if that's needed?

PARTNERS & PARTNERSHIPS

- What nonprofit organizations currently serve those in need of affordable housing in your community?
- What do they offer, and how do they work together? Talk to their leaders at length! Listen to their ideas about where there are gaps, hurdles, and opportunities.

STEP 4

BUDGETING FOR & FUNDING THE PROJECT

Opening Prayer

God of understanding, give us the clarity to see the reality of our financial considerations, and allow us to be steady in our commitment to honor your values as we undertake this project. Amen.

Defining the Financial Scope of the Project

Read through pages 134-39 and determine your approach to the project. Below are just a few questions to start with as you begin your planning.

QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

- What type of housing will be built—new construction or adaptive reuse of an existing building?
- Will the project require long-term debt, and how will that debt affect the rental income needed?
- Will the architect and general contractor be responsible to the developer or the church?
- How will ongoing operational finances be managed, including income, expenses, and building maintenance?
- What public funding sources are available and what are the compliance requirements associated with them? How durable and predictable are these sources?
- Are there federal subsidies involved? How do they impact the rental rates and financial sustainability?
- What are the potential risks associated with relying on public funding for the project?
- How will the team ensure transparency and accountability in financial matters throughout the project?
- Are there any ideological considerations that may impact the team's approach to funding sources?
- How will the team balance the financial aspects with the social mission goals?
- What are the trade-offs of different funding sources in terms of project control and sustainability?
- How will the team ensure that the budget aligns with the community's values and goals?
- Are there any alternative funding options beyond traditional sources that could be explored?





Building a Budget

Budgeting for housing projects is complex. Your team not only needs to consider the initial financial capacity needed for construction and implementation, but also needs to calculate the ongoing operational expenses. The charts below are meant only to be a starting point. Remember to involve financial experts early on in the process.

Funding the Project

Funding for a housing project can be built from many sources. As Cleghorn writes on page 136, "Sources may include local philanthropic organizations, family foundations, state or local government, and nonprofit agencies. In a few cases, a church's ecclesiastical body, such as a diocese, presbytery, synod, or conference might offer exploration grants." As with building your budget, these charts are simply starting points as you research what's available.


